Cornerstone Community Housing is dedicated to assisting men experiencing homelessness who want to change their lives and to changing community attitudes toward homelessness.

Programs



Earl's Place, our transitional housing program located in Baltimore, is named for Earl Johnson, a homeless Baltimorean who was a guest and volunteer for the Supper Club soup kitchen (originator of Earl's Place) until his death. Earl's Place provides supportive housing for 17 men recovering from addiction and homelessness. The program provides the following:

- **Housing that is safe, clean, and secure.** Each resident has a room and access to shared common areas and kitchen. Concerns of homelessness, such as having a place to sleep, shower, and keep belongings, are alleviated.
- **A stable address.** Earl's Place provides a legal address for residents where they can receive mail and phone calls.
- **Support from a case manager.** Residents receive guidance in developing short and long-term goals; locating health care, education, and job training; addressing addiction problems, and moving to permanent housing.
- **Time to address and reverse individual causes of homelessness.** Residents may remain in the Earl's Place program for up to two years.



Prospect Place is a Housing First, HUD-supported permanent housing program for low income men who are chronically homeless and have physical disabilities. Located in Rosedale, the program is owned and operated by Cornerstone Community Housing. The program provides the following for the 12 residents:

- **Permanent safe, secure, and supportive housing.** Prospect Place has 12 efficiency apartments for single men coming out of chronic homelessness. The residents share a large communal living area and laundry facility. The apartments and common areas meet ADA accessibility guidelines.
- **Support from a case manager.** Residents receive assistance with locating health care services, adjusting to living in permanent housing, and addressing individual needs.

CCH OUTCOMES, 2019



A total of 39 men were housed at **Earl's Place** in 2019. Of these, 18 residents completed the program and moved to permanent housing. Four men left the program before completion.

Dante (left) and **Bobby** (right) are representative of the men who successfully reach their goals and find a home of their own. Congratulations to them and their fellow residents.



One of the newer Prospect Place residents moved in December 24, 2019 after about a year at the **Westside Shelter**. **F.S.** is 54 years old and suffered a stroke in 2014. He continues to have some mobility problems, uses a four-prong cane, and a leg brace. He moved into the accessible unit and says that **having his own apartment gives him the freedom to learn new skills, build his**

confidence, and focus without distractions.

A total of 13 men had permanent housing at Prospect Place in 2019. At the end of the year, there were 11 residents and one vacant apartment. Sadly, one resident passed away in 2019. Five formerly chronically homeless men have been in continuous residence since Prospect Place opened in 2015. **Pamela Pryor**, the case manager at Prospect Place, works tirelessly with the residents to set goals and locate resources to make their lives as positive and productive as possible.

WORDS FROM A CCH RESIDENT

My name is Danney J. Hall. I'm writing to you today to talk a little about my process in recovery.

I started my journey on February 1, 2018, which by the way was a check day. This was my second time around trying to get it right. See, the first time I went into treatment I quit after four months. I stayed on the streets for another four months, homeless and getting high, not caring about anything that matters. This is my fourth time in recovery. I missed something the other three times.

But now I know I got it right. Everyone says there is a feeling you get when you are ready to change your life around for the better.

I stayed an extra two months in a treatment program. While I was there, I managed to accomplish quite a few things. I received several certificates for completing certain classes and groups. I received my birth certificate, social security card, and Maryland State ID which, by the way, I never had. When I finally came to Earl's Place about 18 months ago it was really the best decision I could have made.

While here I would say my focus has been on going to Narcotics Anonymous (NA) meetings, gaining employment, saving money, and not using drugs or alcohol. Since Earl's Place is a laid back, healthy environment, it allowed me the time I needed to accomplish some goals. I'm pleased to say that the staff at Earl's Place are heaven sent. I am talking from the Executive Director Sheila suggesting that the clients save money, be in some kind of group and or be working while there, to the Case Manager Jim working with you to put applications to different jobs and assisting you with important appointments. Also, the program's house managers, Renard and Champ, gives every client chores to learn and maintain some type of responsibility for when you exit the place.

Being at Earl's Place allowed me the time to get into a job training program through The Department of Rehabilitation Services (DORS). I completed the classroom portion and earned a certificate. Then I went through the paid job training program at Goodwill and completed that with another certificate in hand. Now I'm gainfully employed at Goodwill Industries full time. Earl's Place has a maximum time period of two years, so you have no excuse to not leave with a few accomplishments under your belt. This is just a little of my success story while at Earl's Place and in recovery.

In closing let me say, there are plenty of treatment centers and transitional houses, but there is only one Earl's Place. I highly recommend it. - Danney

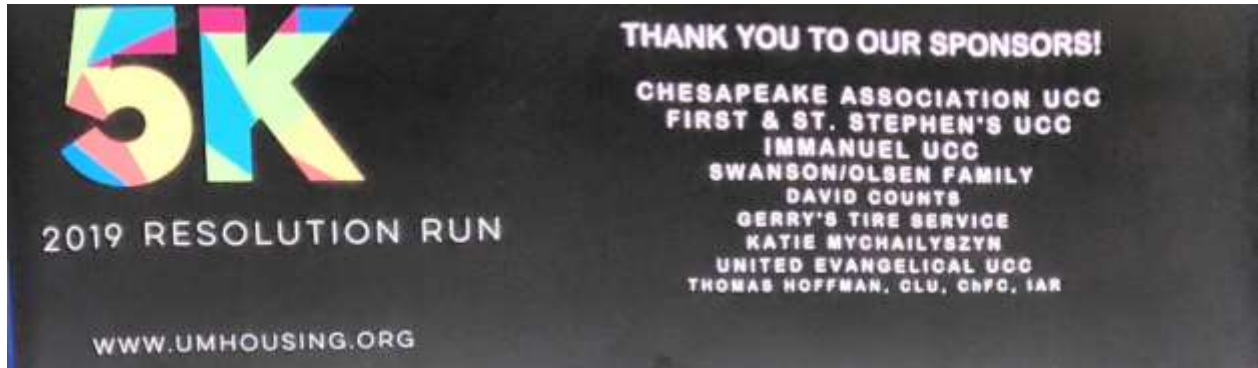


Nando’s Fells Point donates food every week and the employees also did a special collection for the men.

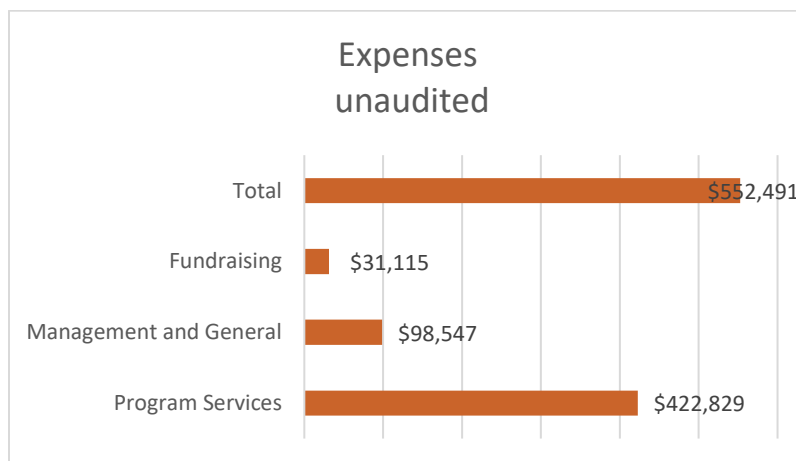
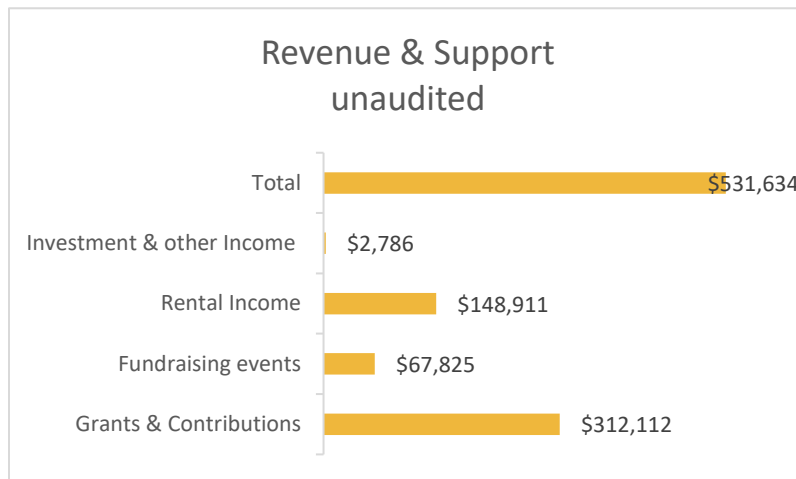
